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Ride to Wellness Grant

Coordination and consolidation are terms all transit providers have become more familiar with in recent years. River Cities Public Transit and Community Transit of Watertown/Sisseton, Inc. are two transportation projects living out those ideals on a daily basis.

The two South Dakota providers along with Vermillion Public Transit pooled their talents producing a grant in 2021 to provide increased travel opportunities for those with limited or no options. The trio identified Veterans, Native Americans, and the elderly whose transportation needs were not being met.

RCPT has been at the forefront of the battle to supply veterans with the travel opportunities they require. The Pierre-based project has been a part of the Highly Rural Transportation Grant (HRTG), an agreement supplying transportation for honorably discharged veterans to and from medical appointments and veteran benefit appointments across the region at no cost to the veteran.

The participants have to reside in counties with a population of fewer than seven people per square mile to qualify for the service.

Our staff realized there were still gaps in service to many individuals needing transportation to medical appointments and we also realized the need to streamline our reservation process," said Ron Baumgart, Executive Director of RCPT. "Our hope is this will allow medical facilities and individuals to eventually schedule their own rides."

When CTWSI consolidated in 2019, they were invited to join RCPT and provide rides to veterans in the northeast quarter of the state. Others involved in this program include Prairie Hills Transit (Spearfish), People's Transit (Huron,) and ROCS Transit (Wagner).

The issue with the grant is it leaves out a large portion of the veteran population in the state. Veterans living in counties that do not qualify as highly rural are not eligible.

"The Highly Rural Transportation grant has been awesome for many, but we were receiving a lot of requests from those in the more populated areas," said Kathy Holman, Co-Executive Director of CTWSI. "We entered discussions with administrators at Pierre and Vermillion and decided to write a separate grant in hopes of filling more gaps in transportation."

While that grant is alive and well, administrators in RCPT, CTWSI, and VPT were searching for a way to provide transportation to the vets and other groups in the more populated counties. Coordination meetings between the three entities sparked conversation leading to the writing of the "Rides to Wellness" grant. Each transit project was responsible for contacting the key stakeholders, collecting letters of support, and creating the document which eventually earned the group \$90,000. Part of the process was to ensure the ability to make the grant sustainable into the future. The development of a software piece was a key component of being awarded the grant.

Educating the stakeholders on the use of the software will provide them the ability to schedule their own rides while allowing the transit dispatchers to determine which trips they could perform and when. User-friendly apps for the passengers are also slated to be developed in hopes of allowing self-scheduling. "We have been working with Shah Software on developing a user-friendly site that can be used by any type of device," said Baumgart. "The challenge will be educating the medical facilities and customers to use the new technology."

"Rides to Wellness" was rolled out late in 2021 and early returns are pointing towards a successful venture on all fronts. Veterans, the elderly and Native Americans struggling to pay for or even find transportation are finding their way to important medical appointments – and at no cost to them.

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Sustaining the grant may prove to be a daunting task, but this is a challenge administrators of the grant feel they can meet.

"Securing funds for any venture is always a challenge but coordinating the talents and resources of everyone lessens that burden," said CTWSI Co-Director Terry Hoffman.

Bis-Man Transit Fare Payment Evolves

Bis-Man Transit has spent the past few years seeking innovative ways for paratransit and fixed-route riders to purchase bus passes. Token Transit was launched by Bis-Man Transit in 2019, offering CAT Bus riders the option to pay for fixed-route bus passes with their smartphone. Bus passes can also be purchased by friends, family, or other agencies and sent virtually via text message. This has offered more flexibility for passengers and eliminated the need to carry cash for purchasing bus passes onboard.

After seeing the success of alternative payment options for fixed-route riders, Bis-Man Transit began investigating possible solutions for paratransit and demand response riders. Utilizing Ecolane dispatching software, staff was able to launch a "diminishing balance" option for the riders. Funds can be added through the company website, over the phone with a credit or debit card, or in-person with cash, credit, or debit card. Diminishing balance eliminates the need for elderly and disabled passengers to carry exact change or purchase punch cards to pay for their ride.

For customers who are not interested in opting into the diminishing balance program, Bis-Man Transit has also implemented online ticket purchasing options for both modes of transportation. Charge account customers and agencies are encouraged to pay open invoices through the platform, as well.

"We have had excellent feedback from riders and guardians who have used the new diminishing balance feature and the online payment option. It really seems to help eliminate some riders' anxiety caused by having to keep track of physical tickets. The change has also cut down on staff time which is an added bonus for us", states Deidre Hughes

The staff and board members were also excited about doing something different. We are hopeful that the trolley might attract some of the college students and younger members of the community to use public transit. It has been an ongoing issue as many of the younger generation consider our vehicles "Senior" buses, even though they have been PUBLIC transit for many years.

We will do an update on the project when we have the vehicle and are using it!
