UP TO THE CHALLENGE

Faith, family and a strong support system have long been the pillars of strength guiding Cody Seehafer in his life. The Watertown resident and Milbank native was recently tabbed as the *Outstanding Citizen with a Disability* by the Mayors Committee for People with Disabilities.

Seehafer was presented the award at a December Watertown City Council meeting by councilman Randy Tupper. Tupper is also the president of the Board of Directors for Community Transit of Watertown/Sisseton, Inc. Seehafer has been a regular rider with the transit system since he arrived in the city less than two years ago.

Admitting boundaries are few and challenges are always embraced, Seehafer is excited to continue his advocacy for people with disabilities as the newly appointed President of the *Mayors Committee for People with Disabilities*.

"Watertown has made great progress in how they provide basic necessities for people with disabilities," said Seehafer. "There is still room for improvement and the purpose of the committee is to bring awareness to the situation. I'm excited to be a part of it."

The first meeting of the new year was slated for Tuesday. While Seehafer had few specifics for his inaugural meeting as president, he was excited to bring ideas to the table. Continuing to equip local parks with handicap accessible equipment is one avenue he would like to continue to explore. Making businesses more accessible and holding city wide events to advocate for people with disabilities is also on his agenda.

"The city is still lagging behind in some areas, especially when talking access to businesses," said Seehafer. "Putting curb cuts in the proper locations and more accessible parking slots are two of the items needing improvement."

Born with spina bifida, Seehafer was able to drive a car, play wheel-chair basketball and walk with the assistance of forearm crutches. Living with this uncurable condition is often difficult, but many individuals like Seehafer, can lead independent and fulfilling lives. His next challenge occurred in 2016 in the form of a cerebellar slump. A surgery was successful, but left him permanently confined to a wheelchair.

"I just get up every day and look at the world with a good attitude," said Seehafer. "I enjoy all of the challenges and I don't feel like I have any boundaries."

Staying active is not an issue. He spends time working out at the Prairie Lakes Healthcare Wellness Center, enjoys working with youth and will soon be writing a weekly column on advocacy for people with disabilities for the Grant County Review, a weekly newspaper in Milbank.

"Staying active is very important and will allow me to remain independent for a much longer time," said Seehafer. "I treat my visits to the gym as doctor appointments." CTWSI has played a key role in his life since moving to Watertown from Marshall, MN. He has not been shy about voicing his concerns, his praises of the system and his concerns when needed. Longer hours of service, consistency of how drivers secure him in the transit vehicles and how the drivers interact with people with disabilities have been questions raised by Seehafer.

"The transit is a good service and I enjoy the drivers, I just wished they stayed open later at night," he said. "Anytime I have questions though, they listen and give me explanations and I appreciate that.
