The eLearning program is completing a module on Active Shooter Training. Under development are ADA, GTFS, ELDT (Entry Level Driver Training Theory Course).



TripSpark Conference in New Orleans Rose Drake Operations Manager Dickinson Public Transit

Erin Humphrey and I attended the TripSpark conference in New Orleans at the beginning of April. Overall, we enjoyed learning about the possibility of new advanced features that may help us to grow our services. We also enjoyed meeting the TripSpark staff and were excited to see they are incredibly open to feedback and suggestions. Some features we enjoyed learning about were the ability for riders to schedule their rides via an app, the ability to pay without cash, and the self-healing capabilities that the dispatching software utilizes to maintain doable rides continuously.

BROTHERS & SISTERS BEHIND BARS

The Watertown Area Community Foundation is a strong supporter of non-profits including Community Transit of Watertown/Sisseton. The Foundation has several annual grant programs CTWSI applies for annually including the Giving Back 365 grant.

CTWSI has been successful the last two years in being awarded funds from this grant to transport clients of various non-profit organizations in Watertown, including the Brothers and Sisters Behind Bars organization.

"We consider our program a success any time we have the opportunity to serve individuals and be able to lift them up," said BSBB Director Stacy Hendricks. "When they come to us there is no pressure on them, it's all up to them what they want to do, what challenges they want to meet."

BSBB is faith-based organization working with people dealing with addictions and trying to get their lives back on track. Getting the members to and from appointments, employment opportunities or even personal shopping trips was identified as one of the biggest needs since many do not own a vehicle or are prohibited from driving. Discussions between CTWSI administrators and BSBB Director Stacy Hendricks eventually resulted in the submission of successful applications to the Foundation's Giving Back 365 grant the last two years.

"We try to provide the clients with their essential needs and encourage them to get the help they need," said Hendricks. "We try to fill in the gaps and transportation was identified as a major issue."

The message they try to put out to members is they are not alone and that there is always hope for breaking free from the cycle of addiction. BSBB wants those in their program to feel loved, supported, understood, and challenged to pursue mental, emotional, physical, and spiritual health so that they can become productive members of their community.

In 2018, BSBB began meeting with inmates in prisons and jail cells to speak with and mentor individuals. Listening to their issues, and frustrations about life in general created bonds. When the Covid-19 pandemic moved in, Hendricks and her seven member staff turned to Zoom and were able to continue their work with inmates.

"Watching these people work through their issues grabs at your heart, they are not bad people," said Hendricks. "I was afraid of them at first, I quickly realized, we are no different, just in a different place."

There have been many success stories directly related to the efforts of the BSBB. As a United Way applicant, CTWSI is required to identify and write about a success story as part of the application. Watertown resident Samantha Schave is living proof of the success of the program and how the transportation grant has played a role in her life.

"BSBB saved my life literally and transit played a major role," said Schave. "I was not too interested in what they had to say when I first got here, but now I have a job, a car and a home. I still have obstacles to clear, but I'm in a better place."

CTWSI provides rides daily for BSBB clients and Schave was one of the initial users using transit to and from work daily. Hendricks said she has conquered many of the challenges put before her and continues to make steady progress as she moves through the program.

"Samantha has set many goals for herself and has met most of those, but she still has issues to deal with," said Hendricks.

Since being awarded funding for transportation of BSBB clients, CTWSI provided 83 rides in Fiscal Year 2020; 153 rides in FY 2021 and 299 Rides in FY 2022.
